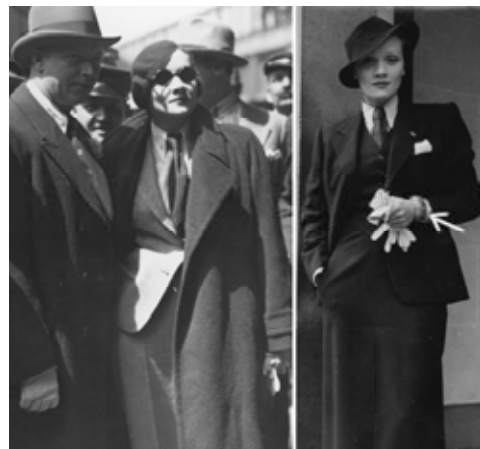
French law annulled after 214 years

A law dated from the year 1799 has been annulled this year. According to the law women were forbidden to wear trousers except they could get an official permission by the town government. Without that permission they risked being taken in custody.

The law was not cautioned by any fashion reasons but women should not wear this symbol of the revolution as long trousers were a sign of the working classes which were so different from the upper class wearing knee-breeches. These woman workers having been named as "Sansculottes" ("Without knee-breeches") were the backbone of the French revolution.

The law got reformed twice, 1892 and 1909. However, the changes remained rather on a low level: women were allowed to wear trousers only if they kept either the handlebar of a bicycle or the reins of a horse.

Because of this law the press speculated that Marlene would be arrested if she arrived in trousers. As Marlene not only came to take her yearly European vacation but also to present her new film "Song of Songs" on September 2nd Paramount surely did not dislike the discussions.

On May 19 1933 Marlene arrived at Paris Gare St. Lazare neither riding a horse nor a bike but wearing men's clothes. The press celebrated the scandal and young Parisien ladies very soon joined this fashion style in public. To calm down the atmosphere Marlene attended the police's annual charity event at restaurant Ambassadeur for the benefit of Maison de Santé du Gardien de la Paix. The evening was organized by Madame Chiappe, wife of the head of the police Jean Chiappe. The restaurant was decorated in the style of the famous german film "Der Kongress tanzt" and Richard Tauber, just coming from Germany after he got beaten up by the Nazis, sang his famous tune: "Du bist mein ganzes Herz". As a Thank-you-gift Jean Chiappe gave Marlene a wooden bracelet.



Deutsche Kinemathek celebrates 50th anniversary

In February 1963 the city of Berlin founded the Stiftung Deutsche Kinemathek on the basis of Gerhard Lamprechts enormous collection of films and film related items. Lamprecht was a film director (a.o. „Emil und die Detektive“, D 1931) and collector.

On the occasion of it's 50th anniversary Deutsche Kinemathek edited a three volume book on Lamprecht and a new Museum's guide which contains a chapter on Marlene as well.

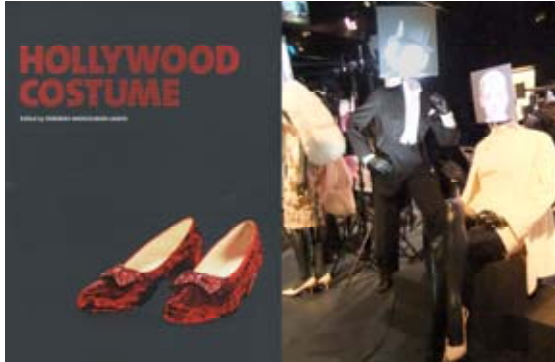


Hans Georg Will in June 2006

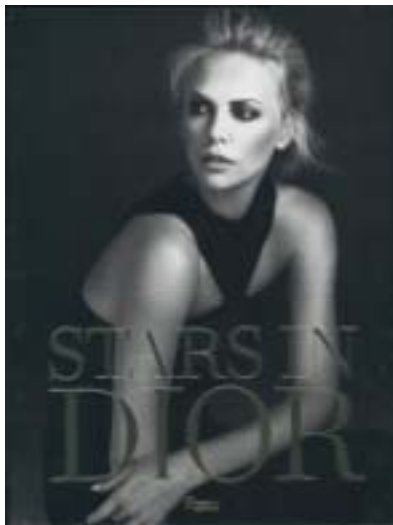
Past and New exhibitions

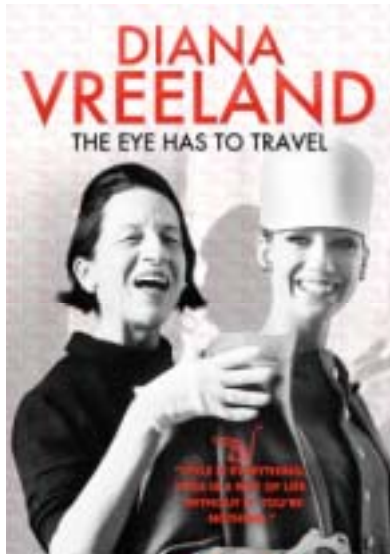

Diana Vreeland: The eye has to travel

The documentary from 2011 by Lisa Immordino Vreeland, co-directed by Bent-Jorgen Perlmutter and Frédéric Tcheng is available on DVD now: Color, Dolby, Subtitled, Widescreen, NTSC, English, Region 1; 86 minutes

In 1974 when Diana Vreeland was working on a costume exhibit for the Metropolitan Museum of Art and asked Marlene for her white tails from "Morocco" or "Seven Sinners."

Marlene answered:

"Dear Miss Vreeland, I received your letter here in Sacramento and I would appreciate your source of information to be made known to me. It does not matter about you, but it does matter to me who else knows my whereabouts. About your request, here is my answer: I cannot give you my white Tails nor my Black Tails because I am still wearing them. The costumes from Morocco and Scarlet Empress were made at Paramount Pictures and are not in my possession. I understand that the Wardrobe

department of Paramount does not exist anymore, -so I don't know what to suggest as

an alternative to find the costumes. I think that there is no trace of them. Travis Banton, who made them died long ago, so there is no source there. Sorry not to be able to help. Many thanks and regards M. Dietrich."
