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The anniversary of the first showing of "Morocco" has been on November 14<sup>th</sup> 1930. ### **McLellan (III)**

Page 106 refers to Salka Viertels memoirs: "The kindness of strangers":  
"A casual reader will miss Marlene entirely, and for a good reason: Salka would keep her later promise never to mention the name Marlene ... She kept her vow by referring to Marlene as "Mary" ... After (Penthesilea's) premiere, wrote Salka, 'Mary Dietrich' took over the title role, 'but her voice could not endure the strain and I was advised to be prepared to step in for her'. Salka Viertel indeed replaced Mary Dietrich in the play Penthesilea which was directed by Felix Hollaender at the Deutsches Theater. Mary Dietrich was a member of the ensemble of the Deutsches Theater as was Marlene. The only thing that puzzles us is that the year the play was staged is 1911 when Marlene was just ten years of age. Another mystery solved: Marlene Dietrich and Mary Dietrich are two different persons. So sorry, Diana.

### **More business news**

A Richee vintage portrait with the signature of Marlene is on sale through L'Autographe, 1 rue des Barrières, CH-1204 Genève (Suisse) for 2.500,- DM (\$1.000)

A collection of letters and postcards by Marlene to Bianca Berger from the seventies was sold by Antiquariat Knut Ahnert for 16.500,- DM (\$7.500). Included were several books on and by Marlene, some of them signed. The sale made the news.

There is a new book out on graves of famous people buried in Berlin. Marlene's grave is on the cover and the author thought it was a clever

idea to hold a press reception at Marlene's grave. The press pictured him laughing and proudly presenting his book while leaning on Marlene's gravestone. The event was sponsored by an undertaker. You think that's bad taste? Well, we think you are right.

If you walk to Marlene Dietrich Platz at the new Potsdamer Platz area in Berlin you find a sign in honour of Marlene Dietrich saying: Marlene Dietrich 1901-1992. Berliner Weltstar des Films und Chansons. Einsatz für Freiheit und Demokratie, für Berlin und Deutschland. (Berlin's Worldstar of Film and Chanson. Dedication to Liberty and Democracy, to Berlin and Germany.) The statement is signed by Hermann Kreutzer and the Kurt Schumacher Society. You may well ask yourself like the rest of the world: Who is that guy? What society? Never mind, it is just a way to make yourself known to the world by using Marlene's name. Why don't some of you write a letter to the Senat of Berlin asking to put up your own statement on Marlene? It seems everybody is allowed to do this if he pays for it.

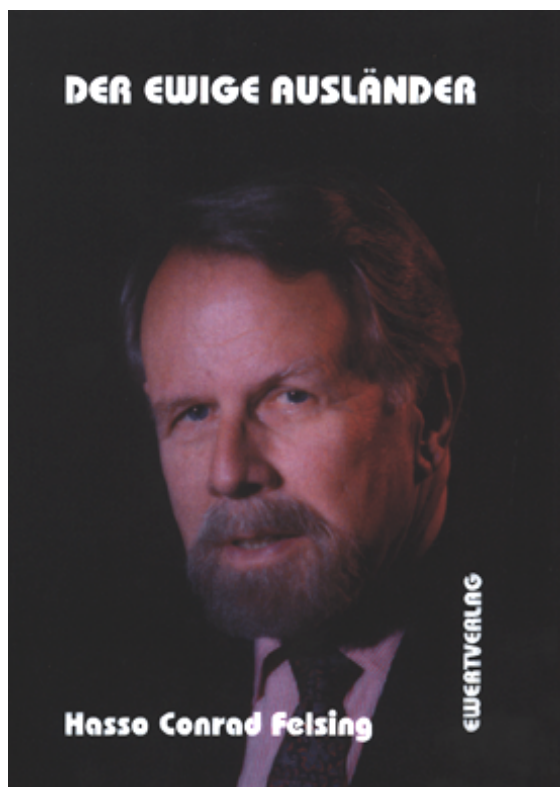

### New Books



Hasso Conrad Felsing: Der ewige Ausländer  
Lathen (Germany): Ewertverlag 2000, 268 pp., 39,90 DM.

Hasso Conrad Felsing is the nephew of Marlene, his father Max was the brother of Marlenes mother. Hasso was born 1922 and has a stormy life story which he publishes here for the first time in german. The parts I read is a translation based on the book "Hasso" he already published in 1996 at Minerva Press in english, but there may be new chapters

included. It is particularly interesting for members of this e-mail club to get first hand informations on Marlenes mother and Jolly Felsing, the wife of Max and mother of Hasso. The book has a lot of photos printed separately but the quality of the printing is rather poor. Even with the lead Hasso gives us we have not been able to detect Marlene on one of the photos that shows a "Maskenball". However, as this is such a small publishing company and probably only a few people know of this publication at all, this will surely become a collector's item.
