Q: I was wanting to find some more information and images on Marlene entertaining the troops in the WW2, would you have any ideas?

Q: My Grandfather was one of Marlene Dietrich's backup musicians when she toured with the USO in Europe during World War II. His name is Cliff Scholl, and he has told me stories of his time on tour with her. In a recent Television biography, produced by Ms. Dietrich's grandson J. David Riva, I saw a brief glimpse of my Grandfather on stage with her. I am hoping to get some of the pictures that he has of his years in the USO tours. Is their anyway that I could be sent a J-PEG image of Ms. Dietrich on stage during the war? If so, it would be greatly appreciated by my whole family. My Grandfather is very ill now and he would love to see some stills of Ms. Dietrichs' act.

A:See "Her own song" and look for the new book by Maria Riva and MDCB: Photographs and Memories. A lot of never seen before photos are in there, especially of the war time period.

Q: I was just wondering if there is a Marlene fanclub, and if so, how do I get to be a member? A: Well, you are right here. Welcome.

Q: A couple of weeks ago, I saw the documentary "Das zweite Leben der Marlene" about the Marlene Dietrich Collection. They showed a book that someone had written about her. She has written comments (a.o. "bullshit", "untrue", etc.) about the contents next to the text in the book.

A: This is Alexander Walkers book "Dietrich" published at Thames & Hudson, London in 1984.

Q: Hello, I am a great fan of Marlene Dietrich and would love to sometime go to your Marlene Dietrich Exhibit at the Berlin Museum however, do to my current work status, I am not able to. However, my wife also loves Marlene Dietrich and she asked me if I could get her one of Marlene Dietrich's Outfits, so I amasking you (politly) if you are able to produce a exact replica of a showgirl outfit that Marlene Dietrich wheres in "Blonde Venus" and also the HUGE Ostrich Boa in "Seven Sinners". I am willing to pay for both but if I do not have enough money for both to be produced, then I will settle for the boa from "Seven Sinners". Please e-mail me back soon. Thank you.

A: The only replica we have done so far is the postcard from "The blue Angel" – the one with the feathers which Emil Jannings is blowing up. This is available in the Museum Shop only. And we do not do any mailing of items on sale at the museum shop.
